A local cooking lesson with a true Jordanian cultural experience

Why not come and experience a Jordanian cooking lesson with a difference, a lesson that not only involves the cooking of some delicious local dishes, but also takes you through the experience of local markets in Amman with a friendly Jordanian lady who will teach you how to pick the best vegetables and spices for the meal you will prepare with her.

See and experience the places where local vegetables, fruits and spices are brought to the market in downtown Amman and after they are collected from the fields outside the city.



Listen to the different stall owners yelling the prices and then have it explained to you what the different smells are. Take the opportunity to taste some of these fresh vegetables and fruits before you are taken off and shown how to prepare and cook them. The markets of downtown Amman are full of the rich flavours and smells of a huge selection of different spices and herbs that have been the essential part of Jordanian cooking for many decades. Much of the original magic remains and is there to be experienced.



“Beit Sitti” which means in English my Grandmother’s House is a chance for visitors to gain insight into the lives of Jordanians in the best possible setting.

Beit Sitti is a place where visitors can enjoy an experience unmatched by any other restaurant in Jordan. Guests are invited to prepare their own meal, in an environment true to the wonderful and beautiful history of Amman and learn how to make a delicious original Arabic dish from scratch.

Beit Sitti is located in Jabal Al Weibdeh which is one of the oldest neighbourhoods in Amman, which has a view unsurpassed by any in this modernizing city. Guests will be guided by Beit Sitti’s experienced home cook.

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The experience will include a four course meal comprised of a salad or a local drink, an appetizer, a main course and dessert. Guests will then dine outdoors while taking in the spectacular view of Amman's old district and the Citadel.



You will leave at the end of the day with a certificate stating that you completed a Jordanian cooking lesson signed by the chef.

Zikra Initiative

Exchanging Cultures

Zikra, an initiative launched by Rabee' Zureikat in March 2007, is dedicated to promote the Exchange concept amongst Jordanians. The initiative aims to bring people and communities closer together so they may learn and accept one another. In doing so, the initiative will bridge the socio-economic gap by bringing people from different communities across the Kingdom together through various activities. The Zikra initiative is re-defining the traditional concept of donations and volunteer servicing by introducing the "exchange" concept. The "exchange" concept establishes a relationship between the participants and the local community of Ghor Al Mazra'a and spreads empathy, understanding and pro-activity. This is done through a reciprocation methodology. The origin of the initiative's name "Zikra," (the Arabic word for memory) is rooted from the exchange concept.



The Exchange Tourism process is created through an attractions program between the urban and rural community. The Zikra Initiative creates trips for the urban community to travel, participate, and experience Jordan's heritage and roots in interactive workshops led by the local community. In exchange, visitors pay a nominal fee that is channelled into a microloan in addition to other economic and social development projects.

Depending on the season, The Zikra Initiative holds different programs. The local community holds workshops for guests such as tomato picking, hiking or rural skills in exchange for a nominal fee for the trip. The visitors also leave with new experiences on how to cook the traditional Galayat Bandora (Tomato in a Pan), make eyeliner, sew a hatta tassel, creative decorates from recyclable materials, create rosaries out of olive seeds and much more.

Thanks to the exchange program, families now have the opportunity to create a more sustainable income and visitors may get in touch with Jordan's heritage. The Ghor al Mazra'a community has started income-generating projects such as poultry, beekeeping, a bakery, selling clothes and much more! At the same time, over 1,000 visitors have learned and experienced the Ghor lifestyle and traditions.

The Jordan National Gallery of Fine Arts

The Official inauguration of the Jordan National Gallery of Fine Arts (JNGFA) was held under the patronage of His Majesty the late King Hussein and Her Majesty Queen Noor Al Hussein on the 19th of February 1980. The General Director of the museum is Dr. Khalid Khreis.




The Jordan National Gallery of Fine Arts is one of the major art museums in the Middle East. Its unique and vast permanent collection of modern art from the Developing World is internationally recognized. From its inception, the Royal Society of Fine arts has pursued the highest professional standards of excellence in acquiring art works and running the gallery. The collection comprises over 2000 works including paintings, prints, sculptures, prints, sculptures, photographs, installations, weavings, and ceramics by more than 800 artists from 59 countries mainly in Asia and Africa.



Dar Al Anda Gallery

Since its foundation in 1998, Dar al Anda has been known to the world as a gallery of fine arts. In reality, it was not exactly that; it was rather a project that meant to bring together visual and auditory arts, and thus counted as one of the centres of culture and the arts.



Dar al Anda's contribution to both arts appeared in the form of musical concerts, informative literary and cultural activities that took place in tandem with the many exhibitions of fine art. Dar al Anda turned its set goals into reality. It presented a great variety of works to its public, works that were subjected to scrutiny and fine selection. The administrators of Dar al-Anda have by now achieved a judicious sense of experience that enables them to move on and further their possibilities, relentlessly exhibiting a will to cooperate with willing parties.

Dar Al Anda is located in Jebel Luwaibdeh where the terraces of the gallery offer some of the most spectacular views of both old and new Amman.

Jordan River Foundation Handicraft Projects



The Jordan River Foundation started its economic empowerment efforts by focusing on the improvement of status of women in underprivileged areas through three Income-Generating Handicraft projects: the Bani Hamida Women Weaving project, the Jordan River Designs project, and the Wadi Al-Rayan project. The nature of the intervention of the Foundation was reflected through providing women in these areas with employment opportunities while reviving a traditional cultural practice.



Building on its success in Bani Hamida, Save the Children established income generating projects with women living in the Palestinian refugee camps of Natheef and Mahata in 1987. High quality quilts, leather and canvas handbags, olive oil soap, wall hangings and embroidered products were produced by women and sold in Amman. Jordan River Designs was later merged into the Jordan River Foundation portfolio and has evolved into one of the most notable trade names within the Jordanian handicraft industry.

Panorama Complex Museum

The Children's Museum in Amman, Jordan is a non-profit educational initiative of Her Majesty Queen Rania al Abdullah. This exciting venue is the first informal, hands-on learning environment in the Kingdom and is filled each day with the joy of new discoveries.



Opened in 2007, the Children's Museum offers children and families exciting learning experiences through play, discovery and exploration. With over 150 interactive exhibits and an exciting array of year-round programs, ensuring that the Museum is a stimulating, immersive setting where learning and fun go hand in hand. Above all, the Children's Museum is an inclusive place where children can play, experiment, create and interact comfortably with the environment and with each other.



Salt Archaeological Museum

The Salt Archaeological Museum first opened in 1986. It consists of two halls and a main hall. The first holds a wide collection of pottery, large water jars, ceramic lamps, pottery plates, glass vessels and much more.



The main hall shows finds from Wadi Shu'eib and the Roman Mausoleum. These findings include bronze bracelets and coins ranging from the Hellenistic to the Ayyubid period.

The second hall exhibits collections of pottery and glass from various sites in the Balqa' District, mosaics from the south Shuneh Byzantine Church as well as a collection of photographs of traditional houses, streets and suqs (markets) in Salt.



The Children's Museum

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The Holy Land Institute for the Deaf

The Institute was established in 1964 as a small school for deaf children. It has been expanding ever since and has in the meantime become of great importance not only for Jordan but for the entire Middle East.



The HLID offers Rehabilitation, Education, Vocational Training and other Services for deaf and physically or mentally challenged people.



The HLID - Holy Land Institute for the Deaf seeks to develop and provide comprehensive services for people who are deaf, deaf blind or otherwise disabled. It wishes to enable and equip them for inclusion and participation in their families and civic society in a meaningful way. This goal is facilitated by encouraging and training others, both disabled and non-disabled, to take on these tasks as well.

The HLID makes a wide variety of products which can be bought by anyone and everyone. Such as: Benches, Mirrors, Desks, Cupboards, Blackboards, tables & chairs of different styles, woven carpets and much more.

SOS Children's Village

Building homes

SOS Children's Village Association of Jordan is a local, private, non-political, non-governmental and independent social development organization. It was established in 1984 and cares for 345 Jordanian orphaned and abandoned children in its three Villages: Amman, Aqaba, Irbid and seven Youth Houses in Amman, Irbid and Aqaba. SOS Jordan is one of the organizations that care for the largest number of disadvantaged children in the Kingdom. SOS concept pioneered a family approach to the long-term care of needy children. This concept is based on four principles: The Mother, Brothers and Sisters, the House and the Village. SOS Amman and Irbid Villages consist of 12 family houses, and SOS Aqaba Village consists of 8 family houses. Each family house cares for 9 brothers and sisters. The children in each family house are cared for by their SOS mother who provides them with love, security and warmth. The children live together like a natural family.



The SOS Village gives homes to those who are deprived of one. A visit to this phenomenal location will no doubt inspire all to engage in bettering their community and helping others.

Souk Jara (Jara Market)

Souk Jara or Jara Market is a public event held in Jordan each year in one of the oldest neighborhoods in Amman, Jabal Amman which hosts some of the most spectacular views of both old and new Amman. Souk Jara has a wide variety of activities for all.



The market itself has a wide variety of good deals; handicrafts, antiques, homemade items and many more which gives you an insight into Jordanian culture and is a great way to interact with locals. The beautiful weather alongside the atmosphere inside the market will make you want to stay for hours.

For those who only wish to grab a bite and watch the world pass, there are a number of cafes and food and beverages stalls.



This year the Souk Jara Theater has been transformed from a stage with a band to a whole new experience now called: 'Jara Storytellers'; A place where artists perform in front of an intimate audience, and tell stories about their music, their writing experiences and memories. The talents featured will all be local with an original story to tell.

Souk Jara is only held on Fridays and will be back this year from the 13th of May till the 09th of September.

Hot Air Balloon Flights over Wadi Rum



Take a bird's eye view of the beautiful scenery of the majestic mountains in Wadi Rum by climbing into a hot air balloon.

Be it an indulgence for yourself or a surprise gift for a loved one, a hot air balloon ride is a unique experience.

Balloon flights typically take place during the early morning hours and last for around an hour, but guests should allow 2 to 3 hours for the whole experience.

Ultralights fly over the Dead Sea



The club has 1 ultralight aircraft: A Remos G3. The aircraft use a Rotax 912 uls 100 hp engine. The aircraft takes 1 passenger and can be hired for pleasure/sightseeing flights or for aerial photography. Those wishing to take up ultralight flying as a sport can take a course and be trained by qualified flight instructors to a level where they will gain an international qualification.

Your 30 minutes flight above The Dead Sea allows you to discover the Baptism Site, the Lot's Cave, Wadi Al-Mujib. A memorable journey is guaranteed to stay with you for a long time. Aircraft doors can be removed if requested depending on weather conditions.

Skydiving - Tandem Jumps

Experience the thrill of jumping from a plane and skydiving above amazing landscapes without previous training! Tandem parachuting with some of the most professional skydiving instructors in the world will allow you to enjoy firsthand this once-in-a-lifetime free fall experience above the Dead Sea!



Tandem jumping is the easiest way to get an introduction to skydiving with minimal training. It takes approximately one hour from start to finish for your first parachute jump.

On your tandem jump, you will be hooked to a highly qualified instructor for the entire skydive. You will exit at an altitude of 10,000 feet, followed by a 30 second freefall. At 5,000 feet, your instructor will deploy the parachute, and you will then begin the peaceful ten-minute parachute decent and enjoy the beautiful views.

Videotaping is available to capture every moment of your adventure.

Bisharat Golf Club

Bisharat Golf Course is located south of the city of Amman, Jordan and has some of Jordan's most beautiful scenery. Established in 1990, Bisharat Golf course is the first private golf course in Jordan. The 9-hole course, 2754 yards, par 34, lies in 2 natural valleys surrounded by beautiful rolling hills and offers a challenge to golfers of all handicaps. Its natural surroundings will lure you back time and time again.

The Bisharat Golf course has been officially recognized by the Jordan Golf Association.

The charming Clubhouse restaurant is perched high above the golf course and has breathtaking views across the course and of the spectacular Amman National Park.



Bisharat Golf Club will arrange that special wedding, dinner, party, event, concert, or any special occasion with entertainment, music and professional services to complement the mood.



One of the events that were hosted by the Bisharat Golf Club was the 37th IAAF World Cross Country Championship back in 2009 in which participants came from all over the world.

The Jordan Speed Centre



Jordan Speed Centre was inaugurated under the patronage of His Royal Highness Prince Faisal Bin Al Hussein the President of Motor Sports on June 2nd 2006.

Jordan Speed Centre is the only professional outdoor racing arena in the Kingdom.

Jordan Speed Centre is located at the beautiful hills of Um Al Kundum next to the Arabian Horsing Club which is a short drive away from any place in central Amman.

After driving at the Jordan Speed Center you can get the details of your race; time sheets including; best lap, race position, overall time and overall performance chart.



If you are a person who only wants to cheer your friends on while they race; motion cameras placed strategically around the race track have been hooked up to the LCD screens in the viewing areas allowing spectators to closely follow the race.

With all safety equipment provided, drivers are given a comprehensive safety briefing before heading off to the circuit, where Jordan Speed Centre's experienced marshals will be supervising their laps.

The Jordan Speed Center is open to anyone aged 8 and over, Arrive & Drive is available 7 days a week.

Mountain Breeze Country Club



The Mountain Breeze Country Club was established in 2007. It is located in the picturesque Jordanian highlands 32 km north west of Amman. The owners strived to create an area of tranquility where visitors can experience unspoilt nature, beautiful gardens and more greenery than virtually anywhere else in Jordan. Although the area was already covered with oak trees, the owners planted over 3000 pine trees over the last 10 years transforming the area into a forest.

Simply said, there is nowhere else in Jordan where one can experience great food, an excellent natural atmosphere and the ability to experience some of the most exciting outdoor activities known to man.



The Mountain Breeze Country Club has within its grounds Jordan's only paintball field, which covers an area of 15000 m2 with good tree and bush cover, and some interesting topographical features which allows for the execution of advanced tactical maneuvers. Sneak up on your 'enemy' and appear where least expected, as Sun Tzu directed in the Art of War 26 centuries ago!

The Historical Train Ride


Petra by Night

We have chosen key elements of everyday life to focus on, welcoming tourists into the homes and hearts of the people of Petra. With A Piece of Jordan visitors can spend the morning with a shepherd and his flock, horse ride through the mountains, learn how to create delicious local cuisine and eat a delicious meal all whilst getting to know local families.

1. Baking Bread Experience



Fresh bread is an integral part of Jordanian life. No meal is considered complete without bread. The smell of fresh bread baking is one that stimulates the senses. Join the locals in Petra and let them show you traditional breads with techniques that have been passed down the generations.

From baking Taboon in clay ovens that have been in use for hundreds of years, to watching the skillfulness of Shrak being stretched and thrown over skillets that have been seasoned with fires too numerous to count. We can guarantee that the experience of baking bread will be one that you never forget.

On arrival you will meet your Chef for the bread making experience and be served Jordanian tea. Then it's time to roll up your sleeves and get ready to make bread.

After you have tried your hand at the art of making bread you will get a chance to eat the product of your labour. Sitting down with your host, the Chef, and any of the Chef's family members that are around, you will be served a traditional meal of Galayah Bandoora. This is time for you to learn how to eat like the locals. You will be shown how to tear the bread you have made, and use it to scoop up the Galayah. Other traditional sides such as Labeneh, Zait and Za'atar will accompany the Galayah and the freshly made bread. More tea will be served. Your host will then arrange for you to go back to your accommodation.

The whole experience takes around 2-3 hours.

Please note: Taboon bread is made early in the morning at sunrise and only available from April to end of September and the meal you share will be breakfast. Shrak can be made the whole year around, and either in the morning for a lunchtime meal, or the afternoon for an evening meal.

2. Become a Jordanian Chef Experience

With the Jordanian hospitality being legendary it is not surprising that food plays a big role in everyday life. To taste the food will tantalize your taste buds, but we invite you to go further. Take a journey with us to learn local meals with the best teachers possible, the people themselves.



Jordanians believe that to cook beautiful food you must feel inspired and content. You will be invited into your "Chef's" home. Here you will learn how to create and cook your meal surrounded by the warmth and smiles that is Jordanian hospitality.

On arrival you will be greeted by your Local "Chef" for the Become a Jordanian Chef Experience. You will be served Jordanian tea on arrival.

Your Chef will assign tasks to you as the preparation for the meal gets underway. Enjoy the energy in the kitchen as you work together and take the chance to get to know your host as you chat with them about their life. Try your hand at learning the names of the ingredients in Arabic which is sure to impress your guests when you recreate the meal once you are back home. Try as you might your host won't let you help clean up, so sit back and enjoy spending time with the host's family whilst the meal is cooking.

Then it will be time to enjoy the wonderful meal that you have just prepared. Jordanian tea will be served to finish off the experience. Your local host will then arrange for you to go back to your accommodation.

- Become a Jordanian chef experience takes around 3-4 hours.
- This experience can be enjoyed for lunch or dinner.
- You may choose from the following meal choices:
 - ✓ **Maglooba:** Literally translating to mean "Upside Down" this delicious dish is made with layers of Chicken, vegetables and rice in a saucepan. To serve the saucepan is turned upside so that the chicken is now on top and the rice on the bottom. No one can refuse a second helping! (Can be made with no chicken upon request).
 - ✓ **Seneyah:** A favourite home-cooked meal of marinated chicken and vegetables that is cooked in the oven.
 - ✓ **Mansaf:** No trip to Jordan is complete without trying the national dish of Mansaf. Chicken is cooked in a sauce made from reconstituted dried yoghurt and served with boiled rice and Shrak bread. *There is a surcharge if you would like to make Mansaf using lamb. Please enquire when booking. For vegetarians we can offer an alternate dish using the yoghurt sauce.

3. Cooking in the Great Jordanian Outdoors

This is the ultimate destination dining experience. In a stunning location, in the surrounds of Petra, you will learn to cook a traditional Jordanian Meal. Enjoy the flavors that cooking over an open fire impart.

Your Chef will assign tasks to you as the preparation for the meal gets underway. Enjoy cooking in the beautiful outdoors as you get to know your host. Try your hand at learning the names of the ingredients in Arabic which is sure to impress your guests when you recreate the meal once you are back to your home. There will be time to explore whilst you are waiting for your meal to cook. This is a great opportunity to take some photos.

It will then be time to enjoy the wonderful meal that you have just prepared. Hot from the fire you will want to lick your plate clean to enjoy every last morsel.

Jordanian tea will be served to finish off the experience. Your local host will then arrange for you to go back to your accommodation.

- You may choose from the following meal choices:
- ✓ **Jordanian BBQ:** Spiced chicken cooked over open coals. Served with baked potatoes, onions and tomatoes.
- ✓ **Tannikah:** Spiced Chicken, potatoes, onions, garlic, tomatoes and deliciously flavoured rice slow cooked over coals in an enclosed drum.
- ✓ **Seneyah:** A dish of marinated chicken and vegetables that is cooked in an enclosed tray which is set in a bed of coals.

4. Olive Harvest Experience

After a year hard work lovingly tending to their trees, in late autumn, families in Wadi Musa come together to celebrate the annual olive harvest and we want you to join them!



At 10am you will head into the valleys of Wadi Musa with a local family, where you will laugh, work and eat together as the sun shimmers through trees whose roots have been standing for more than 50 years. Your experience will start off with a morning tea that includes fruit and a cup of traditional Jordanian tea, made on the fire. After it's time to get your hands dirty! Help local families picking their treasures from the trees. It's hard work but a lot of fun as well! For lunch you will be invited to sit and enjoy a picnic style lunch, being part of a cultural exchange that you will never forget.

At approximately 3 pm your day of olive harvesting will be done. After all of that hard work, you will be rewarded with a small bottle of olive oil.

This experience is available in late autumn (**October through November**).

5. Be a Shepherd Experience



Come spend some time with a shepherd tending to their flock. It's a chance to experience a way of life that hasn't changed in centuries; a time to marvel in the beauty of traditions and customs passed on through the ages.

In the hills around Petra and Wadi Musa, shepherds head off at first light, with the flock falling into line, each with their place. They move to the steady, melodic clanging of the bells of the donkey and lead sheep. Along with the bleating of the sheep and gentle guttural "Hey, Hey" of the shepherd it creates a "symphony of the hills".

Your local English speaking host will meet you at your accommodation, or arranged meeting point. You will be transported in a 4x4 vehicle to the location of the flock. Here you will meet the shepherd.

The shepherd will demonstrate how the sheep move to the clanging of the bells and for younger members of the experience they might like to have a turn riding the donkey. Watch the shepherd expertly milks a few sheep. The fresh milk will be heated over a fire, and with plenty of sugar added, you get the opportunity to taste this sweet drink. A pot of Jordanian tea will also be freshly brewed if the milk isn't quite to your taste. Enjoy the tranquility of the surrounds before being transported back to your accommodation.

This experience will last approximately 1-2 hours.

6. Farm Day Experience



Immerse yourself in nature with hands on farm visit. A short distance outside of Petra lies the village of Jarba, well known by the locals for its rich lands and plentiful ground water making it perfect for growing a wide variety of produce.

Depart from your Petra accommodation mid-morning, arriving at the farm just in time for morning snack and a freshly brewed pot of Jordanian tea. Get to know your English speaking host and the farm workers before lending a hand with farm life.

Depending on the day and season of your visit, you may find yourself assisting with harvesting, preparing the land for planting or tending to the trees that stand so beautifully. There may also be the opportunity to help with the day to day handling and care of the farm's livestock. Your host will prepare you an appetizing lunch, which where possible will be made with produce you have helped pick from the farm. Enjoy a relaxing afternoon on the farmhouse terrace, continue lending a hand to the farm work or wander the property to explore.

In the late afternoon you will depart the farm and return to your Petra accommodation. If you are travelling with young children please let us know beforehand so we arrange some extra special farm activities for them.
